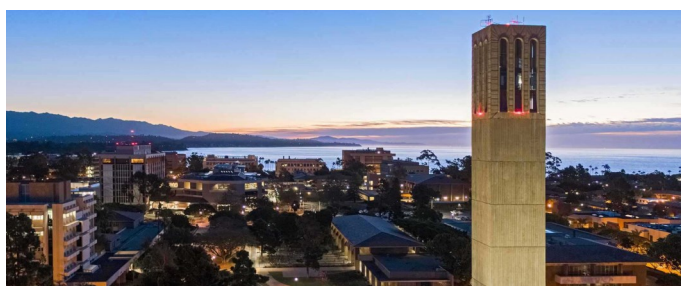

Dr. Giakoumis has been selected to be one of three District Teachers of the Year, the first time that Magnolia High School has sent teachers to be in the running for the Orange County Teacher of the Year in back-to-back years (Mrs. Mundy was selected last year).

For the past 15 years, Dr. Giakoumis has worked at MHS, as the athletic trainer, then a science teacher, and now as the Project Coordinator for the Magnolia Agricultural Community Center.

Along with her work as a teacher and MACC coordinator, she also co-chairs the Science Department with Mrs. Morgan and is an adjunct professor at night, teaching math and science credential courses at UC Irvine. Her husband also teaches at Magnolia. She's one of those absolutely unforgettable teachers who has the respect of the faculty, staff, and students for her hard work ethic, her ability to work well with others, and her devotion to her students.

Orange County Teachers of the Year are announced in April/May of this year.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT/CHRIS MOUA

Advanced Placement Exams: a sort of “coup de grâce” of an A.P. class for most students. Students consider many factors when enrolling in these classes.

First, the main purpose is college credit. Most California colleges will take a score of 3 or more on an exam and give you credit, which ultimately saves you time and money that would be used for taking the class in college. Taking Advanced Placement classes improves your chances of getting into select colleges, as they prove to the college that you are willing to push yourself and further your education.

A.P. classes during the pandemic however caused controversies. In 2020, A.P exams such as European History were shortened to a single DBQ. Consequently, many students who were stronger in multiple choice questions, but weaker in writing felt that the exam did not properly represent what students had learned. In 2021, the exams were finally full length, but because they were virtual, College Board altered how they wrote questions in order to mitigate students using the internet to search for answers. This was also seen as unfair, as the College Board essentially made the tests more difficult for that year.

This year, it is still unclear whether tests will be

held in person or online due to the ongoing pandemic, but here are some general exam taking tips:

1. Answer every single question, whether you are confident in your answer or not. Guessing penalties have been gone from the exams for over a decade now, meaning there is no harm in guessing. When guessing, remember to consider the process of elimination.
2. The people who read your essays want to give you points. With essays, test examiners are not looking to nit pick your writing. Remember to cover all possible nuances of the question in order to show your understanding.
- 3 Remember to manage your time. You only have around 2 or 3 minutes to answer each question. If you find yourself stuck on a particular question, move on to the next because if you spend too much time on trying to get one question right, you will have to rush other questions, increasing your chances of getting wrong answers.

Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math were all highlighted during the massive event. This year's crowd dwarfed previous years, with crowds numbering around 5000.

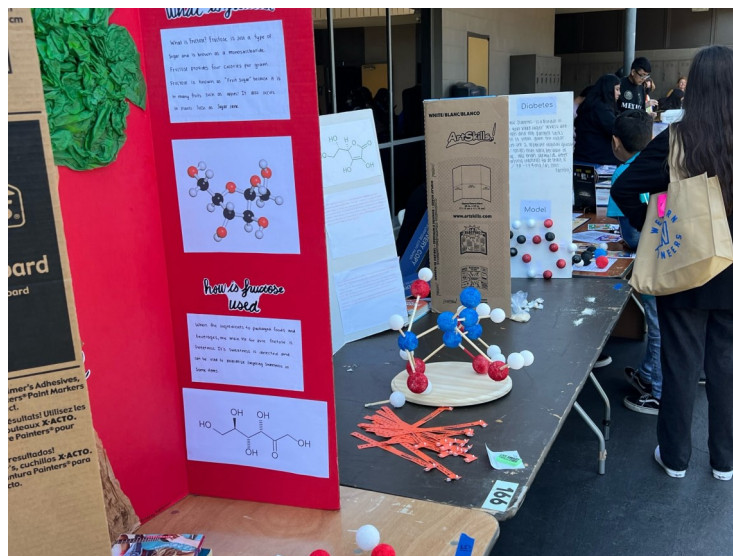
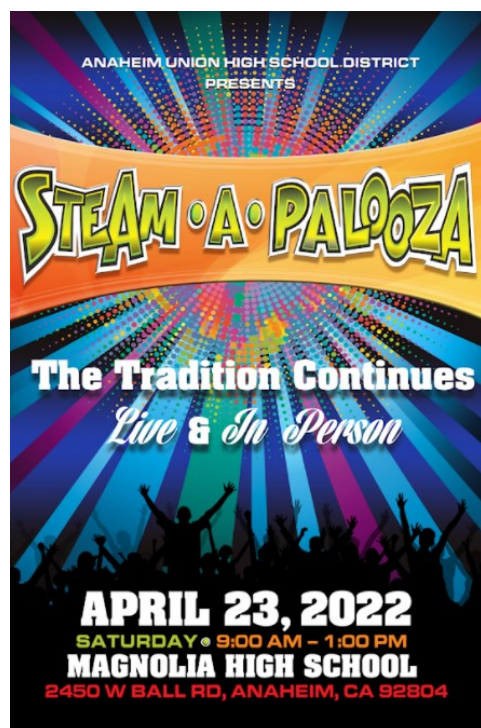

- ◆ Make sure you attend every class and stay focused (i.e., no multi-tasking) during the class.
- ◆ Create a schedule for when you'll accomplish each homework assignment.
- ◆ Read 20 minutes a day.
- ◆ Email teachers to see what missing work can be made up.
- ◆ Look through Schoology and make sure everything is accurately entered.
- ◆ Ask your teacher what the late-work policy is.
- ◆ Keep in mind—your teachers want you to succeed. Ask for help.
