

The Medical Pathway, also known as the Patient Care Pathway consists of learning different aspects of Medical careers. Students that take part in this hands-on pathway will have the opportunity to learn the foundations of the healthcare industry. Such examples that have been taught over the years are the expansion of medical terminology, notice vital signs, perform first aid, and understand infection control. Through the given electives, students study the Anatomy and Physiology of the human body, while gathering in-



sights of cultural aspects of healthcare, and much more to offer. Students that are dedicated to this pathway will also be provided with real world example labs with the proper resources and guidance. The Medical class electives can be very beneficial as their classes are considered as an UC "D" Science credited for A-G requirements for high school and UC's. This also leads the students to become prepared to enter the Capstone Medical Assistant. All students will

learn how to perform EKG's specimen (electrocardiogram) collection including venous blood and capillary blood samples. MA's will also learn how to prepare and administer injections while assisting with a variety of medical exams including routine surgery. MA's will become American Heart Association CPR certified before the students leave from high school. MA students will become job ready before they graduate.

For those that are very passionate in the Medical field, there will be internship opportunities that can take place during your high school years with the needed requirements being met. 



Hey, Sentinels! As we are into the 4th quarter of the school year, the city of Anaheim is quickly expanding their resources and opportunities to all youth, especially towards high school students. The City of Anaheim, AUHSD, OCAPICA, and universities

such as CSUF have partnered up to establish a youth Anti-Vaping Endeavor research paid internship known as Anaheim AVE!

Anaheim AVE was founded by OCAPICA in the year of 2020, the time of period where all events were held virtually. Originally, only two students from each high school within the AUHSD were selected to represent their schools. The mission of Anaheim AVE is to build up student leaders in their communities by educating themselves (inward focus), educating the public (outward focus), and educating decision-makers (upward focus). A special mention of the two students that were selected to represent Magnolia High School was Jahkoyah Boyce and Alyssa Muldong who are still current student researchers. As the first cohort was finalized with students that consisted from different schools, as youth advocates, they had captured real-world data through





a survey with students' thoughts on toxic addictions then subsequently used the given info to continuously find different ideas and methods to display our information along with spreading awareness. Now, Anaheim AVE has become a larger supporting community and has gained recognition by people such as by Al Jabbar, a member of the AUHSD Board of Trustees and collaborated with other youth-led organizations. 

#### AUHSD FILM ACADEMY / Liana Sanjines

The AUHSD Film Academy is an AIME program offered by our school district. Students from every high school come together to create films and learn about cinematography. The academy focuses on teaching students how to work different aspects of the film process in order to create documentaries, short films, music videos etc. They help students embrace their creativity on each film they create, and the process of bringing an idea to life. The summer program is about 4 weeks long, held at Katella High School where the programs advisors, April Monera, Jeff Numainville, Nicole Montoy, and Adrian Olmedo teach students skills like how to operate a camera, how to use editing softwares such as Adobe Premiere Pro, and how to work lights and microphones when interviewing someone. Students also meet many students from across the district who share the same passion for filmmaking. They build connections with students, advisors, and go to events such as the Newport Film Festival, a Warner Bros tour, Chapman tour, and a USC tour. Students get to experience what it's like being a filmmaker in an environment where the advisors encourage them to grow and learn as individuals. They get to ask questions to Chapman and USC film students and get a feel for what it's like to study there. This opportunity is offered to students in grades 9-11 in all AUHSD high schools. A \$599 scholarship is also offered within the completion of the program!

On March 10, 2023, Silicon Valley Bank (the 16th largest bank in the U.S.) collapsed because of lousy investments in stocks and bonds (\$209 billion in assets & \$175 billion in deposits), this spooked depositors which caused a run on the bank with depositors attempting to withdraw all their money from their personal and business accounts get closed/shut down by the Department of Treasury. This became the second-largest bank run in United States history, since the 2008 financial crisis. Due to the spook, customers




withdrew over \$42 billion within 10 hours of the bank run, causing the bank to "ran out of money".

As the 10 hours of the bank run was occurring, the U.S. Department of Treasury seized the bank and closed the bank. Many account holders couldn't get hold of their money and the FDIC will only insure account holders up to \$250,000, however, those SVB customers have well over \$250,000 because their customers were small tech-start-ups, wealthy business owners, or big corporations. Due to this

collapse, people are worried about a domino effect occurring with other banks collapsing due to panic and fear with negative fallouts occurring like First Republic Bank being under 60% pressure or PacWest down 40%.

Many Government Officials suspect that SVB was given a bailout to avoid stress on the U.S. economy and a Government investigation is occurring as of right now to determine what went wrong within the bank and why did it fail. On Monday, March 13, account holders of Silicon Valley Bank with be able to access their money/deposits and accounts as directed by the U.S. Department of Treasury and the U.S. Government.

A same event occurred in Switzerland with the oldest and biggest bank, Credit Suisse. The collapse of the banking system with Credit Suisse was with the connection of now-bankrupt Greensill Capital and Bill Hwang's Archegos Capital Management including assets dropping to 8.5% as it made the equity of the shareholder worthless. It forced the Swiss Government to put the bank up for sale with the biggest competitor LIRS (Union Bank of Switzerland) as they be



gest competitor UBS (Union Bank of Switzerland) as they bought Credit Suisse for \$3.2 billion dollars.

If this trend continues with more banks collapsing, it can promote slow economic growth, lost trust in banks, and a decline in investing which possibly give a nudge for the stock markets to collapse.

#### EARTHQUAKE IN TURKEY / Hadia Zakir

On the 6th of February 2023, at 04:17 TRT, a massive earthquake hit Turkey, causing widespread destruction and loss of life. The earthquake, which measured 7.5 on the Richter scale, struck in the province of Elazig, located in the eastern part of the country. The earthquake was felt across a wide area, including in neighboring countries such as Syria. It caused buildings to collapse, roads to be destroyed, and communication lines to be cut off. In the immediate aftermath of the earthquake, there were reports of people trapped in collapsed buildings, and rescue workers rushed to the scene to try to save lives. The earthquake also caused significant damage to infrastructure, including power and water supplies. Hospitals in the affected areas were quickly overwhelmed with injured people, and many had to be evacuated to other areas for treatment. The Turkish government responded quickly to the disaster, mobilizing emergency services and deploying the military to assist with rescue and recovery efforts. The international community also rallied to provide aid and support, with many countries offering assistance in the form of money, equipment, and personnel. Donations have been pouring in to help those affected by the disaster, and volunteers have been working tirelessly to provide assistance.

While the earthquake has been a tragic event, it has also brought people together and highlighted the strength and resilience of the Turkish people. The earthquake was a stark reminder of the power and unpredictability of nature, and it emphasized the importance of being prepared for such disasters. In the aftermath of the earthquake, there were calls for better building standards and improved emergency preparedness measures, including early warning systems and evacuation plans. It is important that as a community, we should continue to offer our support and assistance to those affected by the earthquake. We

I peered over your shoulder, Beaming with a smile.


Fingers in sync,
