As you have seen in front of Magnolia High's campus, there's a building that is underway and increasing its preparation for the launch of our cyber building in May 2024! In the upcoming school year, the Cyber Building will be ready to go and accessible to all students and staff. The implementation of this new building will enhance the room capacity, office space, and classrooms specifically designed for the Cybersecurity Exclusive Pathway. Teachers, mentors, and cyber students will be able dive deeper and acquire more practical expertise in the cybersecurity and computer science fields for their future workplace.

The Planning of the Cyber Building:

The cyber building was planned out with the awareness of Superintendent Michael Matsuda and the Program Coordinators of the Cybersecurity Program, Mrs. Keledjian and Mr. Derbish. As cybersecurity is gaining recognition and there is an exponential increase in student interest, it has been acknowledged that we need a space to fully realize the potential of this pathway. The new building is planned to offer high school students computer labs and five dedicated classrooms for the cybersecurity program. Additionally, a new look at the campus will be implemented with a color scheme that has already started with the band and choir rooms. The new addition to the campus will allow the cyber students to have more spacious learning environments and the access needed to start preparing themselves for college and career readiness.

Mr. Derbish, a teacher who teaches Cyber Literacy 1 and Cyber Innovations, expresses gratitude and excitement for what lies ahead for him and his future and current students. He shares, "I am truly excited about the new building and all that it is going to have for our students. Their ability to collaborate with other classrooms and their ability to have more hands-on training. Having workrooms to store all the materials is going to make the classroom seem less cluttered and have more space for students to collaborate and work in a structured setting." And with that, an extensive number of involved individuals are eager to experience the new cast of Magnolia's campus and see what the future holds in store.

Councilman Leon was elected in November 2022, but has been serving his community since before he was given a seat on the council. While in high



ment for students. However, the athletes and coaches involved with aquatics weren't always so fortunate.




to her multifaceted personality.
